The Servant Hourglass





Overall Summary

6-8a, 36-39 (History)	Kings : Uzziah, Ahaz, Rezin, Pekah, Assyria, Hezekiah, Sennacherib, Merodach-Baladan, the Lord Responses : repentance and obedience vs. rejection	
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8b-35	The Lord will subdue all the kings of the earth

The Lord will subdue all the kings of the earth (8b-35) and restore (40-66) his penitent and obedient people (6-8a, 36-39) from their sin and chastisement (1, 3, 5) to be exalted as king (6-8a, 36-39) over every rival (2, 4), bringing joy to his servants (8b-35 refrains) but everlasting suffering to his enemies (40-66 refrains).
